Save the Family

Save the Family was founded some 35 years ago by Edna Speed, who is the Chairperson of the charity. Edna is a strong person with a wonderful humour and an enormous compassion for small children. Plas Bellin is a large house in North Wales; a refuge for homeless families who are rescued and saved before a total breakdown. Most families are referred by the Social Services or the Police at a stage when they are broken and devastated, usually because of severe debt, alcohol or abuse problems.

Hannah is an example: She arrived with two small children when she fled from her boyfriend who had subjected them to domestic violence. They arrived at Plas Bellin in their pyjamas; they had no-one else to turn to.

The priorities of the staff are:

- 1) to give them a roof in one of the small cottages,
- 2) to identify the reasons for homelessness,
- 3) to take action to address these problems.

The older children are helped with their education, especially if they have fallen behind. They are taken and collected from local schools, and assisted with their homework in the evenings.

There is a parent and toddler session each morning, and in the afternoons the babies and pre-school children spend time in the nursery while the mums are taught cookery, parenting and budgeting skills. They are given the knowledge and confidence to lead a happy and established family life. The families eventually move into local outreach homes where they continue to receive support from the team. **Save the family** is unique in that they keep the families together for however long it takes to work through their problems, which can take 3 to 9 months. More importantly the children are not taken into care.

Christian services are held on Sundays, and although not compulsory most families attend and really enjoy them. They perform a nativity play each Christmas which is heart-rending as they fully understand what it is like to have 'no roof over their head or anywhere to rest.' Last Christmas I was so overwhelmed when I saw the Christingles the children had made, and the mums were encouraged to create a first family Christmas for their children in the cottages.

Save the Family have purchased another refuge, Cotton Hall at Cotton Edmunds, where more families can be helped and saved.

This building should be ready by mid summer, but the whole enterprise will cost £2.2m. There will be more residential units, a children's centre, day nursery, drama theatre and music room. It is a very ambitious project, but Edna and her team are totally dedicated to this new home, especially as more and more desperate families are waiting for their help and numbers are continually being referred by the Social Services. Children will be saved, saved from brokenness, and saved with a passion and love that never dies, I know because I've witnessed this working.

At St Michael's we are fundraising to help with this project and in the autumn we will be collecting items for the children and their homes, but more about that later.

I want you to think of Jesus on the cross, broken for me, broken for you, and know that through his love and our own care and enormous efforts, these damaged little lives can be healed.

Many thanks to everyone who gave me plant pots, plants and helped to sell the plants.

Woman and a Fork

There was a young woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her things 'in order,' she contacted her Pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes.

She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in.

Everything was in order and the Pastor was preparing to leave when the young woman suddenly remembered something very important to her.

'There's one more thing,' she said excitedly. 'What's that?' came the Pastor's reply. 'This is very important,' the young woman continued. 'I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand.' The Pastor stood looking at the young woman, not knowing quite what to say. 'That surprises you, doesn't it?' the young woman asked.

'Well, to be honest, I'm puzzled by the request,' said the Pastor.

The young woman explained. 'My grandmother once told me this story, and from that time on I have always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who are in need of encouragement.

In all my years of attending socials and dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favourite part because I knew that something better was coming...like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance!



So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder 'What's with the fork?' Then I want you to tell them: 'Keep your fork . . . the best is yet to come.'

The Pastor's eyes welled up with tears of joy as he hugged the young woman good-bye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the young woman had a better

grasp of heaven than he did. She had a better grasp of what heaven would be like than many people twice her age, with twice as much experience and knowledge.

She KNEW that something better was coming.

At the funeral people were walking by the young woman's casket and they saw the cloak she was wearing and the fork placed in her right hand. Over and over, the Pastor heard the question, 'What's with the fork?' And over and over he smiled.

During his message, the Pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the young woman shortly before she died. He also told them about the fork and about what it symbolized to her. He told the people how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them that they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either.

He was right. So the next time you reach down for your fork let it remind you, ever so gently, that the best is yet to come. Friends are a very rare jewel, indeed. They make you smile and encourage you to succeed. Cherish the time you have and the memories you share. Being friends with someone is not an opportunity, but a sweet responsibility.

Share this with everyone you consider a friend...and every time they pick up a fork they will remember - the BEST is yet to come!

Christ for All in Andhra Pradesh

For some years now, St Michael's has been supporting the work of **Christ for All** in Andhra Pradesh.

Some of you reading this will perhaps remember the visit of Azariah and his wife Vijaya; What a wonderful godly man he was.

John Mark, who was at the time Azariah's deputy, visited us too after one of our young people, Jenny Mahon, spent some time in India working at Andhra Pradesh.

John Mark has now taken over as leader, following Azariah's death in a motor accident.

The work includes many of the areas that, in this country, would be covered by Government, or local agencies, such as schools, orphanages and medical centres.

They also run a leprosy village and cover many other aspects of welfare.

During July, August & September, we will be focussing on this work reminding some, and introducing to others, what is being achieved with very small resources.

There will be a display in Number 28 showing photos and giving other information on how we can continue to support this work.



Please continue to pray for the work, especially for John Mark and his team, as there have been some difficulties following Azariah's death. Hopefully these are gradually being resolved.

Rogation Service at Field's Farm, Occleston on Sunday 29th May

Sue and I attended the Rogation service with about 30 others. This was led by Liz. Not having attended one before, we were interested to see what went on.

We met by the barns at 7pm to find one freshly born calf had arrived about an hour before we did

During the service, we walked round the farm buildings and to a field, guided by Mr Platt, reading bible verses and singing parts of various hymns. The chorus of a hymn we had just sung "all good gifts around us are sent from heaven above" were very apt walking round the farm

This was followed by a short Communion service.

We then had tea, coffee and an excellent buffet provided by all who attended. We were invited to see the calves being computer fed, and also watching the cows being milked at 8pm! Many questions were asked and answered.

I can remember working on a farm during school holidays 1965ish, everything was done mechanically, cows were milked twice a day, not a computer in site, and milk went into churns! How farming has moved on! Milking is done 3 times a day, 5am, 1pm, and 8pm. This gives a 20% extra yield, all monitored by computers, to the extent that they know how far each cow has walked between milking, yes each cow has a pedometer on its leg! What an excellent and educational evening it was.

Thanks to Mr Platt for hosting the event, Byley for organising, and Liz and Thia for officiating. If you have not been to a Rotation service, then make a note in next year's diary.

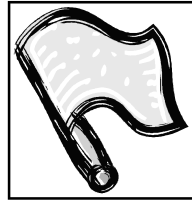
Tuesday, 9 August

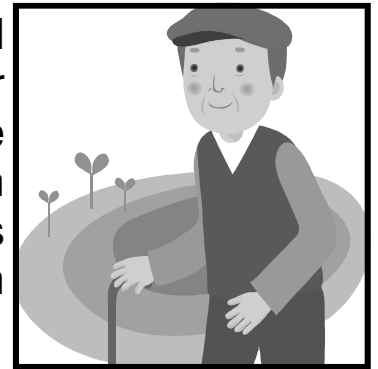


A wonderful bee decorates a church column in St. Michael's during the Boat and Folk Festival, courtesy of local primary school children

DIOCESAN LAY CONFERENCE

Four of us (Elaine Reynolds, John English, Christine and myself) joined some 220 representatives attending the Swanwick Diocesan Lay Conference – “The Greatest Story – Never Read”, to mark the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible. I learned that King James was furious that the Geneva Bible of 1560 included explanatory notes that were critical of the powers of the King. He did not want that sort of comment being presented in his Churches so ordered a version he approved! Apparently 2 million copies were initially run off - there were only nine thousand Churches then so plenty to spare.

The Swanwick Conference centre is in a delightful setting in Derbyshire, the food excellent - and the bar was open late – drinks with both Archdeacons! The original stately home has been much extended with scattered buildings on a hilly site so John, without his electric scooter, was really struggling but had help from Elaine!



The number attending averaged about one per Parish so Middlewich was well represented. In fact, apart from a group from Sandiway who were assisting with the Conference organisation, we did not come across any others from our Deanery so it was good we all went to wave the flag.

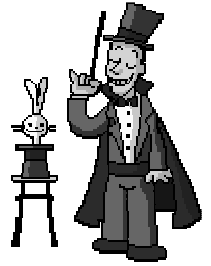
The main speakers were Simon Chesters, the leadership development adviser with the Church Pastoral Aid Society (CPAS) and Joanna Cox the National Advisor in Lay Discipleship and Shared Ministry at Church House in London – the C of E Head Office. They led all the four plenary sessions and worked wonderfully together, Simon with his attractive out-going personality and Joanna with her quieter more reflective approach.

There were 22 Workshops, mostly led by diocesan speakers. These were spread over three sessions so the four of us could only cover under a half. Most sessions were aimed more at personal Bible study rather than training us to spread the Gospel. I was not surprised that very few had opted for the more administrative session on Growth Action Planning, and about half of these decided to change to another group.

There were five services in the Chapel, two were at the very uncivilised time of 7.45am - so I did not discover how well they were attended! I

always find it inspiring being in a full Church with people who sing lustily. I for one did not mind the Services verging towards the traditional – the one concession was a Music Group (including Christine) rather than a Choir.

At the other extreme, John Archer the Magical Comedy Entertainer filled in an hour after dinner on Saturday evening. He immediately had us all laughing, aided and abetted with people selected from the audience – I recall John spinning an imaginary racket as if at a match.

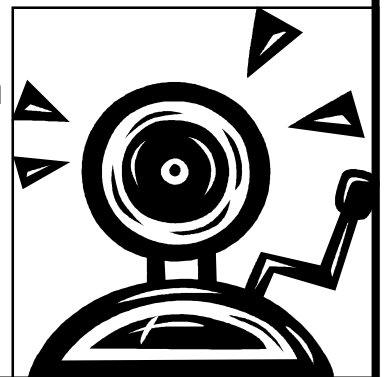

Two new Priests

Amidst the hustle and bustle of the Folk and Boat Weekend, Thia Hughes and Gill Stanning were enjoying a silent retreat at Foxhill in preparation for their priesting on Saturday afternoon. They were among a group of 18 who had been ordained deacon last year, and who were now completing their journey to priesthood.

The service as always was conducted beautifully, and started with a robust rendition of 'O worship the King, all glorious above', followed by the greeting and the prayers of penitence. Thia and Gill were then presented to the Bishop of Chester by our Archdeacon, Michael Gilbertson, while our former Rector, Ian Bishop, presented the candidates from the Macclesfield archdeaconry. The candidates were duly identified as being 'of godly life and sound learning', after which we had the readings, the sermon and the creed. The candidates then responded to nine questions relating to faith and life with the words 'By the help of God, I will' and in due course the Bishops (all three of them, supported by the Training Incumbents) laid hands on each candidate in turn and called on God to send down the Holy Spirit to equip them for the work of a priest. Each of them was then presented with a Bible, and we moved into a communion service for all those present in the cathedral. The service concluded with a rousing singing of 'Ye servants of God, your master proclaim' and we emerged from the Cathedral to greet our newly priested friends.

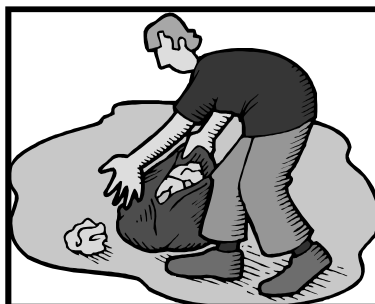

Byley in the beginning of July 2011

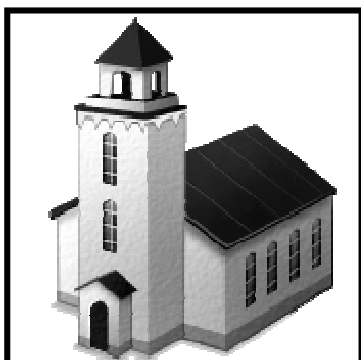
